This orator introduces himself as "The Arkansas Traveler" on Signifying Monkey. In his book Pissing in the Snow and Other Ozark Folktales, Vance Randolph collected "Senator Johnson's Great Speech" recited by one H. A. Converse in Little Rock, AR. It is noted that the gentleman had a manuscript copy in hand but delivered the speech from memory. Whether it is he or some other "razorback" on these records is not known but the recording of Mr. Speaker is very similar to the published speech of the mythical senator. It has been conjectured that this was a satire written by Samuel Clemens upon the occasion of the Arkansas legislature's establishment of the official pronunciation of the state's name in 1881. Arkans-ASS seems to have lost out in the early balloting; as a consolation Mr. Buttbuster's Complaint is recommended.

First name Ovron, born September 29, 1907. Starting out as a Jimmie Rodgers sound-alike, he went on to become one of the best known singing cowboys. Early in his career Autry certainly recorded suggestive songs in the Jimmie Davis mold like "Do Daddy Right Blues." He claimed to have written "You are My Sunshine" but did not. He never claimed the following but one listen will convince most collectors.

Note: These two cuts were probably recorded separately in Chicago then dubbed together onto one matrix in New York. "...Cherry" is a parody of "Bye Bye Blackbird" with stanzas like "Put your ass against the wall/Here I come balls and all..." Whether this was actually distributed in some quantity or manufactured strictly for the amusement of record executives is still the subject of debate but there was a considerable amount of effort invested in creating this record and more than one copy is extant.

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Bud AVERILL

Vocalist and pianist who ran a large club called Bud Averill's Airport at 674 S. Vermont Avenue in Los Angeles in the 1930's. He played the Theremin in the Airport's Paradise Café and later recorded an album of Stephen Foster songs for Tech-Art records. He had a bit part in the movie "The Devil's Mask" (1946) as well as soundies. Died in 1957

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Benny BELL

Real name Ben Samberg, born March 21, 1906, by the mid-1920's he was working as a song plugger and doubtless trying to place songs of his own. His first published tunes cashed in on the country music stampede ushered in by Vernon Dalhart's success. His biggest tune of any relevance to this volume was "Sweet Violets," a fill-in-the-blanks sort of double entendre lyric written to a tune from an 1890's German-American musical "Fritz among the Gypsies." It was arguably the catalyst of the entire party record phenomenon. He was a prolific writer and a determined recordist, making recordings in his own basement studio.

Bell underwent a revival in the mid-1970's as radio stations ventured to play "Shaving Cream," which eventually made it to the top 30 singles. (The first Vanguard LP reissue mistakenly used Phil Winston's recording.) Bell died on July 6, 1999. Note that many of his records are not risqué, some are not even intended to be comic but they are listed here for the sake of completeness. Radio Novelty and Bell Novelty share the same address and it is not certain if the performances which appear on both labels are identical.

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Dale BELMONT

Born May 3, 1924 in Concord, MA. Real name Mary Elizabeth Collins. Made her stage debut at age 3 in Maynard, MA and later sang on WBZ in Boston. Billed as "Sinatra in Skirts," the highly photogenic model and sometime actress appeared at the Versailles and Casablanca clubs in New York City during 1944. 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Gladys BENTLEY

Born in Philadelphia, Jan. 12, 1907. A prominent figure in the Harlem Renaissance, she performed in tuxedo and top hat at Harry Hansberry's Clam House on 133rd Street. The speakeasy was fictionalized as The Lobster Pot in Blair Niles' 1931 gay novel Strange Brother. She recorded for Okeh in the late 1920's and moved to the West Coast in the late 1930's as the Harlem Renaissance declined. In the 1950's her homosexuality and far left affiliations became a serious problem so she recanted her former lifestyle in "I Am A Woman Again" published in Life magazine. Joined the church and died Jan. 18, 1960.

These recordings have been associated with Leroy Hurte's Bronze Records, a Los Angeles firm operating out of a storefront near Central Ave. but they predate any known activity on his part. The first session is sonically inferior to the second but considerably more explicit lyrically. "Diddle and Save the World" is a parody of the 1935 "Rhythm Saved the World," an ephemeral pop tune with a very short shelf life that would seem to indicate a recording date ca. 1936 and a New York recording location. "Christopher Columbus" is not the riff tune by Chu Berry but a bawdy song "Christoforo Columbo" with a tenuous association with the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

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Nan BLAKSTONE

Born Naomi Ewald in Minnesota 1905. Attended high school and music school in Chicago, adopted the stage

name Blackstone, later dropping the "c" from the name to avoid confusion with the famous magician Blackstone. Appeared in "The Far Cry" at the Liberty Theatre, NYC in 1926. In 1930 she was in Ruth Selwyn's "Nine Fifteen Review" and starred in the Theatre Guild's Garrick Gaieties in the summer of that year. In 1931 she was at the Club Argonaut, NYC with "pansy" star Jean Malin. Opened at the Monseigneur in London, January 26, 1932 for a short appearance and went over so well that her engagement was extended through the summer. Returned to the U.S. in November to appear in "Forward March." Headlined at the Caveau Basque in Feb. of 1934, The Casino Town Club with Bruz Fletcher in March/early April, then moved to the Petit Palais. She appeared at the Clover Club in Los Angeles in 1934-5 and married Heine Brand in October. H. Brand produced a recording session in March of 1936 during one of her many dates at Chicago's Colony Club. To the Yacht Club (NYC) in 1936. Her face was disfigured in a 1937 car crash but she returned to performing after a couple of months' recuperation despite lingering dental and spinal problems.

Her publicist restyled her name to "nan BlaKstone" during a trip to the west coast in May of 1939 where she was making \$500 per week at the Little Eva. She appeared at the Moulin Rouge in New Orleans in 1941, the Chase Hotel in St. Louis and the Cafe Esquire in Montreal in 1942 where one late-Winter reviewer raved "Nan Blakstone could bring a Montreal audience to an unheated barn."

About the only time in her professional career that she stayed put was during the six months she ran her own Club Carousel at 8 West 52nd St. in New York City in 1944. In conjunction with this venture published a collection of her special material as "Nan Blakstone's Party Room" with second husband and manager Ronald. A. Gerard. Despite being much younger than Nan, Gerard controlled her business affairs and managed her act. He designed advertising, organized the presentation and controlled the bookings.

She finally achieved the ultimate recognition available to her profession when she was officially "banned in Boston" during a run at the Satire Room of the Hotel Fengate late that year. Though her material was for adult audiences she experienced relatively few problems with officialdom while performing. In fact she was brought in to replace some scandal-ridden black performers at Lindsay's Sky-Bar in Cleveland in 1942. Only La Conga, N.Y in 1943 had serious problems with her act and she would return to the Fengate in 1947. Broadway beckoned in 1946 and she headlined Irving Kaye Davis' play with music "Cap and Gown." In 1947 she had a highly successful run at Ruby Foo's in Montreal.

Ben Lane of Gala Records began to court Blakstone and Gerard early in 1947 as the two-year moratorium on re-recording tunes for other companies approached the expiration date but there was considerable suspicion regarding Lane's accounting practices. Gerard began to work with Detroit writer Haviland Reves, a stringer for The Billboard and personal friend in order to secure a deal with a more trustworthy company. Saffady of Vogue records was initially enthusiastic but withdrew. Industry veteran Max Lipin was putting together his Cosmo/Crown catalog and forecast massive sales potential for Blakstone's material. A tentative recording date was set for March of 1947 but this deal, too, failed to materialize. Snubbed by Manor, Jewel and Bullett, Gerard and Reves decided to produce an album themselves but the record industry was in a bad way in the late 1940's and neither one had any real experience. Their Hush Hush project was a disaster because of haphazard distribution and lack of working capital.

Blakstone suffered a stroke in June of 1949 but recovered and was back performing at the Catalina Lounge in Houston by year's end. Died suddenly of a cerebral hemorrhage September 24, 1951.

She was the best-known and highest paid female "sophisticated" performer of the 1930's and '40's, inspiring Reta Ray, Ruth Wallis and many others to abandon the grind of the pop singer. Blakstone's Gala records in particular sold very well, over 300,000 total for the eight discs.

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CANADIAN CREPITATION CONTEST

Known by any number of names, Canada deserves full credit for this rosy treatment of a farting contest.

An undergrowth of legend has obscured the exact origin of this marvelous spoof of broadcast sporting events. The concept may trace its nativity to the holiday season of December of 1942. Lillian Russell wrote that she was present when it was first performed at a party in Toronto. It probably underwent some refinements (Russell claimed that it was she who contributed the name "Windesmere") and may have been performed many times by popular request. The authors recorded the script, read by S.S. Brown on one 16" lacquer disc at RCA Victor's studios in Toronto. Perhaps as early as 1943 it was mastered and pressed (it was also widely distributed via instantaneous discs).

Reportedly it was played (or performed) at a New Year's Eve party in 1943 where an unidentified American admiral decided it would make a great morale booster for his sailors. Whether there ever were such under-the-counter V-Discs or not, a variety 78 RPM pressings subsequently made their appearance.

Andrew James Copp, III attended Stanford University and joined the Will Osborne Orchestra as a novelty in November, 1939. Opened as a single at the Cafe Continental, New York City in Sept. of 1940. In the early 1940's, John Hammond caught his surrealist act which was billed "James Copp III and His Things" and booked him at The Cafe Society Uptown and Downtown. The somewhat incongruous appearance of a large man over a little pump organ performing bizarre routines did not lead to a meteoric career in show business. Instead he became a newspaper columnist and cartoonist in Los Angeles and in the 1950's reworked and recorded several pieces including one called "The Noisy Eater" which he took to Capitol Records in 1955. Alan Livingston liked the piece but not his voice so it was Jerry Lewis who performed it on Capitol 3120. Copp was disappointed with the meager royalties. He started his own record company called Playhouse Records and "Jim Copp Tales" with Ed Brown was released in 1958. Even his kiddie records had a macabre, mature edge to them. Copp died on April 7, 1999.

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Dwight FISKE

Born 1892, Providence, RI. Studied at the Paris Conservatoire but became popular at parties for wealthy Americans visiting the continent to avoid Prohibition. Returning to America for his concert debut at Chickering Hall in 1926, he quickly reappeared on the party circuit. Tallulah Bankhead promoted an engagement at London's Bat Club where he was held over for nine months. A fixture at the Savoy-Plaza Hotel's Cafe Lounge in the 1930's, he sounds like he worked his way through school playing silent movie houses. A true pioneer in

the party record field, he understood the career-building value of recordings. Called "King Leer" by Variety, he is the only party performer to record extensively on 12-inch discs. A tireless self-promoter, he published illustrated songbooks; the first, in 1933 titled "Without Music", the second "Why Should Penguins Fly?" in 1936. M.C.'ed Jane Froman's radio program in the Fall of 1934. Fiske closed at the San Marco Restaurant in London July 25, 1936 and opened at Chicago's Blackstone in early August. The following year his third visit was aborted when he was refused a labor permit by British authorities. In 1944 he moved his base from the Plaza to the Versailles in New York City and continued there through 1945. His recording activities continued into the microgoove era and he recorded for Jubilee in 1954.

It must be admitted that his humor does not communicate all that well to the 21st. Century audience. Most of his followers had probably voted for Herbert Hoover and he might best be appreciated as a digestivo to follow a performance of "She Stoops To Conquer." Nonetheless, he was by far the premier risqué comedian of the 1930's and '40's. Sally Rand pirated his material at the beginning of her career. He was in constant demand at the most posh watering holes and any double entendre wit could expect to be compared to the archetypical Fiske. Any study of American humor of the period which omits him is fatally flawed. Fiske died on Nov. 25, 1959.

Previous recordings were done with musical accompaniment, much as they would be presented in a nightclub. Their dialogs were always unaccompanied and probably indicate a background in radio. Their timing is superb and their material is well written. Soon Ruff & Reddy and others followed their example. Doubtless the producer appreciated the savings but this move seems to indicate a shift away from juke box orientation towards the consumer market. A catchy tune can help mask lackluster writing or uninspired singing and musical numbers lend themselves to repeated listening. Unadorned spoken routines demand a certain polish from the performers. Their first recording was a great success and was released on an impressive number of labels. In the late 1940's a female with a similar voice and, on occasion, the same material teamed up with other partners. "Simp" did not. Only the original Hot Shots releases are credited.

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Sophie TUCKER

Born Sophie Kalish in Russian Poland circa Jan. 13, 1884. Her family immigrated to Hartford when she was still an infant using a stolen passport with the name Abuza. Eloping at age 16, by her eighteenth year she was divorced and singing in small New York restaurants. Hitting the vaudeville circuit as a blackface "coon shouter," she was in the Ziegfeld Follies in 1909. During her heyday Tucker was probably the only headliner who was able to mix a substantial amount of risqué material into her stage act. Her hundreds of commercial recordings are but the palest reflections of her ribald personal appearances. In more recent times Bette Middler appropriated a substantial quantity of Sophie's material but the effect of it's delivery by the divinely-endowed "Miss M" is not at all what the weighty "Last of the Red Hot Mammas" achieved. She developed a mix of Old World sentimentality and jazz age sexuality that audiences loved. Tucker was not one of the "sophisticated" club performers. The elements of self-deprecation coupled with an honest delivery seemed to discharge much of the sexual threat of her monologues, though local authorities were known to object to specific songs from time to time. She continued to perform until shortly before her death on Feb. 9, 1966.

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Larry VINCENT

Born. San Jose, CA. Jan. 13, 1901 d. Jan. 5, 1977 Forrest Hills, KY. College educated, he composed legit tunes and was pianist with composer L. Wolfe Gilbert. Appeared at Chicago's Alamo Café in 1926. Recorded for the midwestern Gennett label in 1928. Spent time on the west coast in the 1930's. With WCAU radio in Philadelphia in 1939, also M.C. at Benny the Bum's. Began a lengthy run at the Lookout House in Covington KY., just south of Cincinnati in 1942. Referred to himself as the musical answer to W.C. Fields. Formed Pearl Record Co. with Moe Jaffe in 1946 and, despite the variety of artist credits, practically everything issued by that label is by performed by Vincent. Applied for admission to ASCAP just as it began a campaign against "smutty" songs in 1940, and was finally admitted in 1947 with the success of "If I Had My Life To Live Over." He wrote

several classics of the party genre: "I Used To Work in Chicago," "The Freckle Song" and "The Fishing Song." Pearl was also used to promote the songwriting efforts of Vincent and Jaffe. These efforts were sometimes substituted for one side of the Pearls included here. Sub-masterpieces like "I Grow Gooey over Chop Suey" sold very poorly compared to the party items and are outside the scope of this work.
